


Timothy S. Hopkins served in the New York State Militia during the War of 1812 reaching the rank of Brigadier General. Hopkins was the first Town Supervisor and also acted as a Justice of the Peace.




Christian Eggert settled in Amherst in 1831 at the corner of Main and Eggert and opened a store at this location. Eggert served as the first Postmaster for area using his store as the Post Office. Eggertsville is named after Christian Eggert.



Timothy A. Hopkins was the son of Timothy S. Hopkins. Trained as a lawyer, Hopkins had an active political career. He served as Erie County Sheriff, a State Assemblyman, and as Town Supervisor.



Village Hall - The land for Village Hall was donated by E. Howard Hutchinson in 1908. The building was completed in 1909 and housed offices for both the Town of Amherst and the Village of Williamsville as well as serving as the house for the Hutchinson Hose Company and town library. The building was razed in 1965 in order to make room for a new Town Hall and municipal complex.



Adam Rinewalt was the first publisher and founder of the Amherst Bee. He served as Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes and Assessments, and President of the Village of Williamsville.
