Mohan S. Devgun Ph.D., (Chair)



Mohan S. Devgun retired in August 2022 from SUNY-BUFFALO STATE where he has been chairperson and professor, teaching in the areas of materials, manufacturing and quality control since 1990. His broad international experience includes working in academia and industries in England, Venezuela and the USA. His qualifications include a P.E. license in Manufacturing Engineering (State of Iowa), M.S. and Ph.D. in Metallurgical Engineering from Birmingham University (England), and an M.B.A. from SUNY at Buffalo, New York. Before coming to Buffalo State College, Dr. Devgun had about 10 years experience working in the automotive and aerospace industries in England, followed by about two years period as Rolls Royce Research Fellow in the area of investment castings. From 1977 to 1983, Professor Devgun served as a consultant to the National Council of Scientific and Technological Research (CONICIT) of Venezuela where he was responsible for developing graduate programs in metal forming and manufacturing engineering. Dr. Devgun is also a principle in MMQ Technical Services, an organization specifically established to enhance productivity and competitiveness of manufacturing industry within the Western New York area. Additionally, Dr. Devgun served as member of School Board – Williamsville Central School District for six years.

Dr. Devgun is Secretary of the Sikh Cultural & Educational Society of Western New York and has served in the past its President, Trustee, as well as its Treasurer. He is married and lives in Williamsville area. He is fluent in Spanish, and has SIX SIGMA BLACK BELT certification.
