Simple Colonial Revival inspired design. Building was the subdivision/builder's office for the Cleveland Park Terrace Subdivision developed by Turne | Significantly altered with changes to the original side-facing hip-on-gable mass. A full gable with fish scale shingles, a rear addition, vinyl siding and replacement windows have significantly altered the original domestic scale office. | | |
| 50 Campbell Boulevard | Area 9 | ca. 1880 | 2-story gable-roofed vernacular frame house with early, 20th century porch addition. Wood Clapboard siding; limestone foundation; distinctive window crowns. | Demolished | | |
| 1899 Campbell Boulevard (southeast corner of Tonawanda Creek Road) | Area 2 | ca. 1880 | 2- story L-plan gable roof frame vernacular farmhouse with Eastlake window crowns, porch details, and door. Contributing cross-gable barn | Demolished. | | |
| 320 Capen Street | Area 5 | ca. 1930 | 1 1/2-story front gable Bungalow with stone at first floor. Original Tudor Revival influences featuring stucco & decorative half-timbering at gable ends have been replaced with shingle. Original tile roof replaced. | Alterations to original historic fabric have significantly altered the character defining features of the property. | | |
| 400 Dodge Road | Area 3 | Late 19th century | Complex of agricultural outbuildings. Gable roof barn with "Chew Mail Pouch Tobacco" | Demolished. | | |
| 850 Dodge Road | Area 3 | ca. 1880 | 1 1/2-story front gable vernacular farmhouse, vinyl sided, replacement windows. Side porch and rear addition. Barns demolished. | Residence lacks individual distinction. Loss of significance as agricultural complex due to demolition of barns. | | |
| 1965 Dodge Road | Area 1 | ca. 1930 | 1 1/2-story hip roof Bungalow with Medina sandstone walls & tile roofing. | Frame addition to front elevation has compromised character defining features of the Bungalow style. | | |
| 70 Ferndale Road | Area 8 | ca. 1840 | 1 1/2-story side gable frame vernacular residence with Greek Revival massing and cornice returns. High level of alterations. Non-contributing garage. | Altered with an inappropriate porch, roof line extension and triangular dormers. Very little remains to convey any architectural meaning or its place in the history of the town of Amherst. | | |

| 4287 Main Street (corner of Berryman) | Area 6 | ca. 1880 | 2 1/2 story gable-roofed frame vernacular farmhouse with vinyl siding and replacement windows. Dates to the "C. Berryman Estate" | Later additions to the original structure whose plan is noted on the 1915 map obscure the original form. That in addition to replacement windows and siding compromise the integrity and any understanding of the original building form. | | |
| 6121 Main Street | Area 8 | ca. 1850 | 1 1/2-story front gabled frame vernacular residence with wood clapboard siding. Rear additions. Commercial use. | Demolished. | 02902.000124/N | |

| Franciscan Missionary Sisters of the Divine Child (complex of buildings) 6380 Main Street | Area 8 | ca. 1910-20 | Complex buildings originally part of The Goodyear Estate, a convalescent home & then a convent. | Demolished for new subdivision development.
