
The Possible Lives of 1800s Poorhouse Residents in WNY By Rosanne L. Higgins

Rosanne L. Higgins grew up in Buffalo. Her experiences traveling in both the United States and in Europe as a child and later to Ireland resulted in a love of history and cultural diversity from an early age. In 1998 she earned a Ph.D. in Anthropology from the University at Buffalo where she studied the relationship between biology and poverty during the nineteenth century.

In 2012 she was invited to join the Erie County Poorhouse Cemetery project undertaken by the Department of Anthropology at the University of Buffalo. This project and her dissertation work gave her a familiarity of the



inmates of the institutions in WNY. This led to a historical book series chronicling fictional accounts of poorhouse residents. Each book is an adventure into life as it was in the 1800s-mixing history, spiritualism, love, hardships, and victories. (This edited text was taken from rosannehiggins.com.)

My Mother's Holocaust Story By Bill Lin

April 20, 2023 (12:00 pm – 2:00 pm)

Bill Lin was born in Poland just a few years after WWII to holocaust survivors. Most of his extended family had perished. He has some childhood memories of post-war life in Communist Poland, including incidents of anti-Semitism. The family immigrated to Israel during the 1950s and eventually immigrated to the United States in 1960. Mr. Lin and his wife moved to WNY in 1977 and raised their family in Amherst.

Mr. Lin will present his mother's story. Although many survivors were not able to talk about their experiences during the war, his mother was able to put some of her memories on paper. He uses excerpts from her memoir to talk about her personal journey, about the destruction of much of her family, and about picking up the pieces after the war.

The experiences and suffering of ordinary people during this tragic and tumultuous period educate us about the consequences of bigotry, intolerance, and ignorance. (This edited text was taken from the Holocaust Resource Center of Buffalo website.)
